

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Remembering the Four Chaplains



Each February, the American Legion commemorates the anniversary of the Four Chaplains. For those who may not know about the Four Chaplains., we will give a brief history of the Four Chaplains. It is important to note that there are Four Chaplains Memorials and a chapel in Philadelphia dedicated to the Four Chaplains.

Their story is one of heroism, sacrifice, and tragedy.

Hans J. Danielsen, the ship's captain, was concerned and cautious. Earlier the Tampa had detected a submarine with its sonar. Danielsen knew he was in dangerous waters even before he got the alarming information. German U-boats were constantly prowling these vital sea lanes, and several ships had already been blasted

and sunk. The Dorchester was now only 150 miles from its destination, but the captain ordered the men to sleep in their clothing and keep life jackets on. Many soldiers sleeping deep in the ship's hold disregarded the order because of the engine's heat. Others ignored it because the life jackets were uncomfortable .

On Feb. 3, at 12:55 a.m., a periscope broke the chilly Atlantic waters. Through the cross hairs, an officer aboard the German submarine U-223 spotted the Dorchester. The U-223 approached the convoy on the surface, and after identifying and targeting the ship, he gave orders to fire the torpedoes, a fan of three were fired. The one that hit was decisive—and deadly—striking the starboard side, amid ship, far below the water line. Captain Danielsen, alerted that the Dorchester was taking water rapidly and sinking, gave the order to abandon ship. In less than 20 minutes, the Dorchester would slip beneath the Atlantic's icy waters.

Tragically, the hit had knocked out power Dorchester telegram and radio contact with the three escort ships. The CGC Comanche, however, saw the flash of the explosion. It responded and then rescued 97 survivors. The CGC Escanaba circled the Dorchester,

Commander's Corner—Joe Gallagher



Comrades, I want to wish each of you a most Happy, Wonderful, and Hopeful New Year. It's hard to believe that we are almost halfway through our Legion Year. There are some areas that we all need to accomplish together and I would like to touch on those below and ask that everyone please put these on your lists as PRIORITES to happen quickly.

First and foremost is to get your membership turned in. There is no mystery that both on the National Level and Department Level that we have some major opportunities to improve on processing membership. I can tell you from personal experience at our Squadron 284 that we have been able to accomplish this via processing online via My SAL/My Legion.org. I can also tell you that Department is working diligently on changes to improve the process for all membership that is transmitted via paper as we have for years. Regardless of which way you choose to process your membership, it is most important that you keep copies of everything until you are assured that it has posted at National showing the Membership being paid and active. This ensures that if there is a cyber issue or paper transaction that gets lost, that we have the documentation needed to quickly address the issue and rectify it for all. I am asking as well that if you don't see your transmitted membership show up on the reports that you notify myself or our adjutant Keven Chaplin at once so that we can find out what is going on and begin the process of getting recorded. This ensures that if there is a cyber issue or paper transaction that gets lost, that we have the documentation needed to quickly address the issue and rectify it for all. I am asking as well that if you don't see your transmitted membership show up on the reports that you notify myself or our adjutant Keven Chaplin at once so that we can find out what is going on and begin the process of getting recorded. So, we want to make sure that each squadron's dues are captured, and payment of that amount returned to the squadron. Otherwise, the system will only collect the National amount and the Detachment amount, and the squadron will not be receiving anything. Let's get it in. Virginia is trailing near the bottom Nationally, if you have turned in membership and it isn't showing in the reports let us know ASAP.

Lastly on this subject, if you need assistance with processing/transmitting membership online, please reach out to myself, Kevin Chaplin our Adjutant/membership chair and as always to your respective Vice Commanders. We all stand ready to assist in anyway possible. **Continued on Page 4**

We are coming down to the home stretch in our membership year with about five months left before the year ends. Check your membership card, if it does not say 2022, you are no longer an active SAL member. Please contact your Membership Chairman at your Squadron and get your dues paid.

There have been a lot of changes this year in how our membership is being processed and recorded. Any membership sent into the Departments will now be entered and processed on the MyLegion.org web site and the time it takes to get processed should be much shorter. Our membership reports have not been

accurate for the past several months due to delays in processing at the Department and National. By the time this article is published, we should have some new membership reports in place. All membership data for reports is now coming from the National database. Please check your Squadron's numbers and make sure they are accurate. Squadron Commanders and Adjutants should access the membership portal and make sure your Roster is correct and focus on those members that have not renewed yet. Now is the time to contact them and see how they are doing and find out why they have renewed. Here is the link to the portal: http://mySal.org Members will need to register using their email address.

This membership portal also allows the Squadron Adjutant or the Squadron Commander to process online membership renewals. The portal will give you electronic access to your members' contact information, and you will be able to make changes if needed. You can also download lists that contain phone numbers, addresses and email information. We will be setting up training classes for Squadron Officers in the next couple of months. When you submit renewals or enter new members online, the dues to National and the Detachment will be electronically drafted out of your bank account, (\$10 for the Detachment and \$5 for National per member). National will then send the Detachment their portion of the dues and provide them the renewal information. This has been very successful in other states and the Legion is already processing renewals this way. Please contact me if you have any questions or need assistance.

If your Squadron has not submitted the new Consolidated Squadron Data Report or SDR (See Page 3), please do so as soon as possible. This form documents your Squadron's dues structure and will allow your members to renew their dues online using the National website. Many of you have been asking for this capability and it is finally coming. This feature will be turned on soon and it is vital that your Squadron's dues information is accurate. Please contact me if you need the form or need assistance completing it. **Detachment**

rescuing an additional 132 survivors. The third cutter, CGC Tampa, continued on, escorting the remaining two ships. Aboard the Dorchester, panic, and chaos had set in. The blast had killed scores of men, and many more were seriously wounded.

Others, stunned by the explosion were groping in the darkness. Those sleeping without clothing rushed topside where they were confronted first by a blast of icy Arctic air and then by the knowledge that death awaited. Men jumped from the ship into lifeboats, over-crowding them to the point of capsizing, according to eyewitnesses. Other rafts, tossed into the Atlantic, drifted away before soldiers could get in them. Through the pandemonium, according to those present, four Army chaplains brought hope in despair and light in darkness. Those chaplains were Lt. George L. Fox, Methodist; Lt. Alexander D. Goode, lewish; Lt. John P. Washington, Roman Catholic; and Lt. Clark V. Poling, Dutch Reformed.

Quickly and quietly, the four chaplains spread out among the soldiers. There they tried to calm the frightened, tend the wounded and guide the disoriented toward safety. "Witnesses of that terrible night remember hearing the four men offer prayers for the dying and encouragement for those who would live," says Wyatt R. Fox, son of Reverend Fox.

One witness, Private William B. Bednar, found himself floating in oil-smeared water surrounded by dead bodies and debris. "I could hear men crying, pleading, praying," Bednar recalls. "I could also hear the chaplains preaching courage. Their voices were the only thing that kept me going."

Another sailor, Petty Officer John J. Mahoney, tried to reenter his cabin but Rabbi Goode stopped him. Mahoney, concerned about the cold Arctic air, explained he had forgotten his gloves.

"Never mind," Goode responded. "I have two pairs." The rabbi then gave the petty officer his own gloves. In retrospect, Mahoney realized that Rabbi Goode was not conveniently carrying two pairs of gloves, and that the rabbi had decided not to leave the Dorchester.

By this time, most of the men were topside, and the chaplains opened a storage locker and began distributing life jackets. It was then that Engineer Grady Clark witnessed an astonishing sight.

When there were no more lifejackets in the storage room, the chaplains removed theirs and gave them to four frightened young men.

"It was the finest thing I have seen or hope to see this side of heaven," said John Ladd, another survivor who saw the chaplains' selfless act.

Ladd's response is understandable. The altruistic action of the four chaplains constitutes one of the purest spiritual and ethical acts a person can make. When giving their life jackets, Rabbi Goode did not call out for a Jew; Father Washington did not call out for a Catholic; nor did the Reverends Fox and Poling call out for a Protestant. They simply gave their life jackets to the next man in line.

As the ship went down, survivors in nearby rafts could see the four chaplains-arms linked and braced against the slanting deck. Their voices could also be heard offering prayers.

Of the 902 men aboard the U.S.A.T. Dorchester, 672 died, leaving 230 survivors. When the news reached American shores, the nation was stunned by the magnitude of the tragedy and heroic conduct of the four chaplains.

"Valor is a gift," Carl Sandburg once said. "Those having it never know for sure whether they have it until the test comes." That night Reverend Fox, Rabbi Goode, Reverend Poling, and Father Washington passed life's ultimate test. In doing so, they became an enduring example of extraordinary faith, courage, and selflessness.

The Distinguished Service Cross and Purple Heart were awarded posthumously December 19, 1944, to the next of kin by Lt. Gen. Brehon B. Somervell, Commanding General of the Army Service Forces, in a ceremony at the post chapel at Fort Myer, VA.

A one-time only posthumous Special Medal for Heroism was authorized by Congress and awarded by the President Eisenhower on January 18, 1961. Congress attempted to confer the Medal of Honor but was blocked by the stringent requirements that required heroism performed under fire. 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Scratch one off my "Bucket List"

As a former member of the US Army Security Agency (ASA) who served in Vietnam, I have always had this item on my "Bucket List". That was to visit the gravesite of the first American killed in ground combat during the Vietnam War, an ASA Direction Finding Specialist, SP4 James T. (Tom) DAVIS on the anniversary of his death, December 22, 1961. See: https://www.nsa.gov/Portals/75/documents/about/cryptologic-heritage/cryptologic-memorial/davis.pdf

In conjunction with the Sons of the American Legion (SAL) National Commander Michael FOX's "Flying Flags for Heroes" initiatives to place I million US flags on veteran's graves in local cemeteries, I conducted a road trip to Good Hope Cemetery, Livingston, TN where SP4 Davis is buried.

December 22, 2021 (the 60th anniversary of the ambush that took SP4 DAVIS' life) turned out to be a beautiful, but cold and windy day in rural north/central Tennessee. I was quite disappointed to find nobody else at the Good Hope Cemetery, however it did resolve the issue of how I was going to document my activities there. Tripod and selfies!

I began by locating SP4 DAVIS' grave which has both a civilian headstone and a military grave marker, placing a small US flag on each, as well as a US/ASA banner at the headstone.

After rendering the appropriate honors and taking a few moments to reflect on SP4 DAVIS' ultimate sacrifice, I located and placed US flags on nine other veterans' graves: Gunner Captain Harold D. WILLIAMS, SK3 Daniel M. WILLIAMS, US Navy; SGT Byrd W. BOHANNON, US Army; PFC Tommy Earl PARRISH, US Army; TSGT Kent W. McDONALD, USAF; PFC John Q. McDONALD, US Army; PFC Hollis O. HUNTER, US Army; Wiley WHITE, US Navy; and PN3 Allon WHITE, US Navy. I also placed a flag on a memorial to "James Thomas Davis and all patriots who rest here", dedicated in 2006, by the Southeast Asia Army Security Agency Veterans Association.

While I was packing up to leave, a little old lady arrived and went to one of the graves at which I had placed a flag – that of PN3 Allon WHITE, her late husband of 67 years. Her name is Ethel, and she thanked the American Legion and me for remembering and honoring our veterans by placing these flags on their sometimes-forgotten graves. Come to find out, she had been a classmate of Tom DAVIS, remembered him well, and had liked him very much. --- Ron Perkins (AKA The Unknown Rider)
