We always say that Membership is the Backbone of our organization. Communication is the Lifeline of our organization. The worst thing we can do is not to communicate with our members

The Detachment of Virginia can pride itself on many things. One thing is that with our size, we are well represented at the National Level. We have people serving as Vice Chairman, Veterans Employment & Education Commission, Chairman of the SAL National VA & R Commission. and Child Welfare Committee. We also had people serving on the National SAL Legislative Commission, Children and Youth Commission, and Membership Committee. The people serving in these capacities are serving because of their ideas, experience, and knowledge of the programs of the Sons Of The American Legion.

Our National Officers, Commissions, and Committees work hard throughout the year-not just at the Fall and Spring NEC Meetings—but all year to work the programs, promote the programs, and come up with new ideas to support these programs.

All of this information is not meant to stay at the National Level. It is meant to be sent down to the Detachments and from the Detachments to the Squadrons and from the Squadrons to the 'Blue Cap' Members.

Yes, we said it—the information is meant to come down to our individual members. The intent is to inform but also share ideas within our Detachments and Squadrons. But even more importantly to make our 'Blue Cap' members feel as though they are a member of something larger.

This has forced us to change the way we communicate with our Squadrons. We now have to communicate through our website, Facebook Page, or via email.

We want to make sure that ALL of our Squadrons are getting the best and most up to date information about our activities, conferences, and conventions. We want to have more participation by our Squadrons at our Convention and Conferences.

So, to bring this to conclusion, we talked about the importance of communication and how it is supposed to work. So, what are our next steps. First, if you are a Squadron Officer, please check your email a couple of times a week. We do send a lot of information out to our Squadrons. Secondly, encourage your members to provide you with their email addresses. Email appears to be the most efficient way to communicate. Lastly, share this information with your Squadron Members. 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Detachment of Virginia Wants You!!!

We want you!! Yes, we want you! While we are looking for members to grow our Detachment, we need members from our Squadrons to step up and serve at the Detachment Level. So, where is the help needed?

Help is needed in two areas. One, we need Squadron Members to serve on various Detachment Committees. And two, we need people to serve as various Detachment Officers.

Lets look at the Detachment Committees first. We would like to have our Detachment Committees have at least three people on each committee. Detachment Committees include Americanism, Children and Youth, Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation, Child Welfare Foundation and Children's Miracle Network Hospitals, Public Relations, Information Technology, and Membership.

We would like for each Committee Member communicate to the Squadrons they are assigned the various programs under their Committee. For example, if you were on Americanism, you should be focusing on Boys State, Girls State, Flag Education, National Emergency Fund to name a few. We would also like for a prospective Committee Member to be able to call various Squadrons in a given region to find out what activities they are doing to support Americanism programs.

We would like for our Committee Chairman and Committee Members to have access to a computer and the internet. From time to time a Committee Member may need to do some online research on programs within your Committee.

As a Committee Chairman, you will need to give reports at our Fall and Spring Conferences. The best Committee Report would be one that would promote and inform the membership on some of the programs on your Committee. At some point, we would like to have the Chairman, with assistance from his Committee members, submit an article for The Focus spotlighting some of the programs of your Committee.



It is a tremendous honor for your Squadron to have a Squadron Member serve at the Detachment Level, in any capacity.

The second area, where our Detachment needs Squadron Members to serve at the Detachment Level, are Detachment Officers. Our Detachment Officers where we need help are Detachment Sgt. At Arms, Detachment Historian, Detachment Assistant Adjutant, and Detachment Vice Commander(s)(3).

Detachment Sgt At Arms and Detachment Historian are good places for people to get in at the Detachment Level. This is a great level to see how things operate at the Detachment Level.

For Detachment Vice Commander, we would like for individuals to commit to three years. Two years as Detachment Vice Commander and one year as Detachment Commander. If you do well and are interested, you could serve in a position at the National Level.

For prospective Detachment Vice Commander candidates, in addition to committing three years, two as Vice Commander and one as Detachment Commander, here are some requirements for serving as Detachment Vice Commander. For the Detachment Vice Commander to move up to Detachment Commander we would like for him to have served as a Squadron Commander for one year.

We would like for the prospective candidate to have a steady job with some disposable income to cover expenses until they are reimbursed.

The candidate needs to look the part and be able to address the Legion Family in large group settings. This will help over come the fear of speaking in front of large groups. When attending meetings, conferences, and conventions, you would be expected to be dressed in a coat and tie.

We would like the person to have a computer with basic computer skills. They need to be able to send and receive emails. They will also need to be able to coordinate and hold regular Conference Calls in their regions.

Lastly, we would like the person to have a cell phone and they would need to return calls and messages in a timely manner.

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MySAL—A Membership Tool

Our Squadron, 293 (Purcellville, Virginia), signed up for MySAL in 2013. Our renewals for 2014 slowed and we were able to use MySAL to help make our 100% for the year. Once we got access, we downloaded the information for our Squadron. We were able to create mailing labels for all of our members.

We created a Membership Invoice where we promoted some of our accomplishments at the National, State, and Local levels and explained what their dues money was used for including donations to CWF and NEF. We also requested updates on the Member's information. We then mailed these membership invoices or renewal notices to our unpaid members. As a result of our mailing, we were able to have the remaining unpaid members pay their dues for the year.

When our members sent their dues in along with their updated membership

information, we can go into MySAL and update their membership information, 'real time'. With access to MySAL, your Squadron can better maintain your membership records.

If your members have a change to their information, have them fill out a Member Data Form and use that as your backup when updating their information in MySAL. By maintaining these records on MySAL, this will help you communicate with your members. It will also help the National Organization communicate with your members through The National Update.

MySAL is not set up to do Transfers. The Member Data Form is still needed for Transfers. But you can update other information. You can use MySAL to update Birthdates, Phone Numbers, and Email Addresses. With this information available to you online, your Squadron can keep your members informed on Squadron and Post activities.

You can keep your members informed on Squadron and Post activities. Remember that our members are the lifeline of our organization and we need to make them feel a part of something larger than our local Squadron. MySAL will help do that. If your Squadron has not signed up for MySAL.org, please do so today!

My name is Daniel J. Riegle, and I am a veteran. I fought in the war to preserve the Union. I was 38 years old with a wife and family of five children when I enlisted on February 26th, 1864 in Company I of the 49th Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry. I was a farm laborer and had stayed away from the war as long as I could honorably do so. Times were hard and the \$160 enlistment bonus was as much as I could make working on another's farm in two years. So, to support my family and my country, I was enlisted by Capt. Kephart in the new Company I.

My first engagement with my Company was in the Battle of the Wilderness where we were only lightly engaged. But next, on May 10th, 1864, ours was one of the twelve regiments chosen to assault the Rebel works at Spotsylvania's infamous "Mule Shoe." The 49th Pennsylvania was amongst the twelve regiments, brigaded under Col. Emory Upton, who broke the Rebel line and captured a section of the enemy's guns, but I was wounded twice in the head by secesch musket balls. One left a dent in the left side of my head ½" wide, ¼" deep and 2" long that I would carry the rest of my life. This is where my journey truly began....

I was helped from the field by two comrades and brought to a dressing station. My wounds could not be properly dressed in the field so I was forwarded, through Belle Plain landing on the Potomac, to Campbell General Hospital in Washington City. After a stay there, I was furloughed home and then returned to a convalescent camp in Northern Virginia. Six weeks after my wounding, I was returned to Company I, now at Winchester City. For the rest of the War I remained on limited duty, gaining other physical ailments in camp and continuing to suffer dizziness and loss of hearing in my left ear which would continue for the rest of my life.

The 49th was engaged in many more actions of note as we moved from the Shenandoah Valley down to Petersburg and then pursued the Army of Northern Virginia to Sailor's Creek where we were engaged once more. After that, the 49th was detached and we eventually made our way back through Richmond and Fredericksburg to Northern Virginia and marched in the "Grand Review" for General Grant and President Johnson (after the assassination) down Constitution Avenue in Washington City.

It was in this last that I received the final blow to my health as I passed out from the heat and was unconscious for two days. Upon mustering out, I returned home to Snyder County, Pennsylvania and tried to resume my former occupation of farming. I could not support myself by physical labor and was aided by the charity of farmers who would allow me to work half days and do the lighter work.

You see, in those days there were no pensions or aid from the Government for wounded soldiers. We who had borne the battle and who carried the wounds in our bodies and in our minds were thrown back on our families and our local communities. After the first wave of welcoming home, we were seen as drunks and untrustworthy, as violent, as slackers and undependable as the reward for our service to the nation.

It was then that we began to band together in what became the "Grand Army of the Republic" or G.A.R. for short. I became a charter member of the Major William H. Byers Post, No. 612 of the Department of Pennsylvania. Within our Posts we could talk with other Veterans about what we had experienced, we raised money to help destitute or ill Brothers and to assist the widows and orphans of those who had fallen in battle, or who fell afterward to depression and suicide, and to bury our dead.

When we came together we found we had strength and petitioned the Government for pensions for those wounded or ill due to their service and unable to work (before this, pensions were only awarded on a case by case basis for those who had extraordinarily served the Government) and for the parents, widows and orphans of loyal soldiers, sailors, Marines and Revenue Cuttermen [i.e., what is today the Coast Guard] who died in or because of their service.

We of the G.A.R. were the living embodiment of patriotism when the Boy Scouts of America were founded in 1910 and when our sons went to war in 1898 and our grandsons in 1918. (In our pride, we would not let those Veterans join as we were composed of those who loyally served from 1861-1865. Our descendants went on to form the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion, respectively, freely using our G.A.R. as a model.)

When my days were finally ended in 1901, I was receiving a generous pension of \$18 a month. I was surrounded by my Brothers of the G.A.R. and buried with military honors near my home in Beavertown, Snyder County,

Pennsylvania.

Pvt. Daniel J. Riegle, of Company I, the 49th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry was a real person. He was my twice-great grandfather and the story above is true.

The G.A.R. was the principal Veterans' organization for Union Veterans after the Civil War, being founded in 1866. By the 1890's it had grown to around 490,000 members in ~7,000 Posts across the nation. It was the first and largest racially integrated organization of the 19th Century. It was a political force that lobbied Congress for pensions and services to veterans and their surviving families. It filled the void that existed before there was a Department of Veterans' Affairs and assisted those suffering from physical wounds of camp and combat and what we would today identify as PTSD in the only ways available to it...by being community for and by serving Veterans.

As noted above, the G.A.R. was the model for the VFW and American Legion, which succeeded it. The G.A.R. ceased to exist when the last member (indeed the last reliably documented Civil War Veteran, Alfred Woolson, a drummer boy) died in 1956 at 107 years of age. Today the G.A.R. is represented by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) who were formed by the G.A.R. in 1881 to "keep green the memory of the 'boys in blue" and to be their successor and legal heir.

Today the American Legion stands in the gap for Veterans and families; providing services, petitioning Congress, lobbying the Department of Veterans' Affairs, standing up for Veterans and their families and providing a safe place for Brothers & Sisters who have served and by providing a ready ear and understand when another Veteran needs someone to listen.

My brother, a Navy Veteran of the Vietnam era and my father, a career Army veteran of World War II through the cold war eras, were members of the American Legion and my grandfather, an Army veteran of World War I, was a charter member of his American Legion Post. All stand in the legacy of the G.A.R.

I am myself am a Department of the Army Civilian of 36 years, am a Past Camp Commander of the Irish Brigade Camp No. 4 (SUVCW), Fredericksburg, VA and have the honor to be the current 3rd Vice Squadron Commander for Squadron 364, Sons of the American Legion, Woodbridge, VA. *Jay Rarick, Squadron 364, Woodbridge, Virginia.*

Membership -Harvesting Super Heroes

In keeping with our Commander's theme this year of 'Cultivating our Youth', our membership theme this year is 'Harvesting Membership'. It takes members to carry out the various programs the Sons support.

The 'Big Idea' for our membership theme this year is that the more members we recruit, renew, reinstate or harvest, the more successful our programs will be. Or, we will be able to help more veterans and children in our communities. Our membership goal for this year is 4,675 members.

Our emphasis is to have a bountiful

Harvest so that we can successfully carry out the programs of the American Legion.

Our goals are—Williamsburg (Fall Conference) 35% with no zero squadrons and all Squadrons should be at 35% or higher; Virginia Beach (Spring Conference) 80% with Squadrons having a minimum 70% renewal rate and all Squadrons being at 80% or higher in membership.; and finally Herndon (State Convention) 90 to 100% with all Squadrons having a minimum 85% renewal rate and all Squadrons being at 90 to 100%.

Incentives are Detachment Individual Recruiting Awards for recruiting three

New members, Chuck Belles award for squadrons achieving 110% membership, and 100% Squadron Ribbons.

Our organization is one of heroes. We are being asked to be Super Heroes by recruiting Legion and Auxiliary members. By helping the Legion and Auxiliary grow, the Sons should will grow as well. We are being encouraged to sign up three Legionnaires this year. Currently there are 13 to 20 million eligible veterans that qualify for membership. Scott Williams, Detachment Adjutant.


