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Veterans Day Fishing Tournament

Squadron 327 (Norfolk) held a Veterans Day Fishing tournament to benefit Operation Comfort Warrior. The following is the article published on the national Legion Website on the event.

A 30-minute conversation between a Sons of The American Legion member and the owner of a fishing pier in North Carolina where an annual fishing tournament is held resulted in nearly \$5,000 in donations to the Legion's Operation Comfort Warriors (OCW) program.

While visiting his beachside residence in Avon, N.C., Steve Gower, a member of SAL Squadron 327 in Norfolk, Va., met Joe Thompson. Thompson, owner of Koru Village Oceanfront Resort and Spa and the Avon Fishing Pier, shared

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Detachment of Virginia Wants You!!!

We want you!! Yes, we want you! While we are looking for members to grow our Detachment, we need members from our Squadrons to step up and serve at the Detachment Level. So, where is the help needed?

Help is needed in two areas. One, we need Squadron Members to serve on various Detachment Committees. And two, we need people to serve as various Detachment Officers.

Lets look at the Detachment Committees first. We would like to have our Detachment Committees have at least three people on each committee. Detachment Committees include Americanism, Children and Youth, Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation, Child Welfare Foundation and Children's Miracle Network Hospitals, Public Relations, Information Technology, and Membership.

We would like for each Committee Member communicate to the Squadrons they are assigned the various programs under their Committee. For example, if you were on Americanism, you should be focusing on Boys State, Girls State, Flag Education, National Emergency Fund to name a few. We would also like for a prospective Committee Member to be able to call various Squadrons in a given region to find out what activities they are doing to support Americanism programs.

We would like for our Committee Chairman and Committee Members to have access to a computer and the internet. From time to time a Committee Member may need to do some online research on programs within your Committee.

As a Committee Chairman, you will need to give reports at our Fall and Spring Conferences. The best Committee Report would be one that would promote and inform the membership on some of the programs on your Committee. At some point, we would like to have the Chairman, with assistance from his Committee members, submit an article for The Focus spotlighting some of the programs of your Committee.



It is a tremendous honor for your Squadron to have a Squadron Member serve at the Detachment Level, in any capacity.

The second area, where our Detachment needs Squadron Members to serve at the Detachment Level, are Detachment Officers. Our Detachment Officers where we need help are Detachment Sgt. At Arms, Detachment Historian, Detachment Assistant Adjutant, and Detachment Vice Commander(s)(3).

Detachment Sgt At Arms and Detachment Historian are good places for people to get in at the Detachment Level. This is a great level to see how things operate at the Detachment Level.

For Detachment Vice Commander, we would like for individuals to commit to three years. Two years as Detachment Vice Commander and one year as Detachment Commander. If you do well and are interested, you could serve in a position at the National Level.

For prospective Detachment Vice Commander candidates, in addition to committing three years, two as Vice Commander and one as Detachment Commander, here are some requirements for serving as Detachment Vice Commander. For the Detachment Vice Commander to move up to Detachment Commander we would like for him to have served as a Squadron Commander for one year.

We would like for the prospective candidate to have a steady job with some disposable income to cover expenses until they are reimbursed.

The candidate needs to look the part and be able to address the Legion Family in large group settings. This will help over come the fear of speaking in front of large groups. When attending meetings, conferences, and conventions, you would be expected to be dressed in a coat and tie.

We would like the person to have a computer with basic computer skills. They need to be able to send and receive emails. They will also need to be able to coordinate and hold regular Conference Calls in their regions.

Lastly, we would like the person to have a cell phone and they would need to return calls and messages in a timely manner.

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American Legion Baseball—Early Days

for others while fostering their growth

Baseball, hotdogs, apple pie, and Chevrolet! That's about as American as you can get, at least according to the 1975 Chevy advertisement. That's hard to argue with and the American Legion has embraced baseball since Legion Baseball was founded in 1925. Since then, American Legion Baseball has taught hundreds of thousands of young Americans the importance of sportsmanship, good health and active citizenship. Millions of young men have played Legion Baseball over the years and have seen the organization as a stepping stone to manhood and served their country or community, or played the sport at the highest level in the MLB.

The league was first proposed at an American Legion state convention in South Dakota when it was noted that the American Legion could assist in the training of young Americans through athletic games and that athletic competition teaches courage and respect

into active citizens. From that convention came an agreement to draft a resolution that was then presented at the ensuing national convention in Omaha, Nebraska and was fully supported by National Commander James Drain. The resolution read:

"RESOLVED: That The American Legion...inaugurate and conduct baseball leagues and tournaments for local champi-

"RESOLVED: That The American Legion...inaugurate and conduct baseball leagues and tournaments for local championships, and that local champions determined by the competitions be given opportunity to compete in departmental, sectional and regional tournaments, and that a junior world series championship baseball series be conducted at each national convention..."

1926 saw the vision become a reality when posts in 15 states organized and sponsored teams and conducted championship tourneys. Postseason tournaments at the state and regional levels culminated with a national champion-

Ship that was held in Philadelphia with a team sponsored by a New York post beat a team from Idaho. After the first year, it was learned that the format of the season was a success, but that came at a price of nearly \$50,000. In early 1928 The Legion's first donor to that expense was professional baseball and with that support the program was thriving, that is until the great depression came along in 1933 when Major League Baseball had to withdraw its support. . In 1935 the MLB was able to renew its pledge which is still intact today with a \$40,000 annual contribution, which in today's budget, comes to about 3 percent of the total budget. Flag Education

In 1989 I began my Sons of The American Legion state level career in The Detachment of Maine that office was Americanism I have always gravitated towards Americanism. One of the burning issues at the time was flag desecration in particular the burning of the American Flag. It was rampant at that time and I hate to say it still is. The attacks on the symbol of our country have been many, varied and relentless. As you can see this spans almost thirty years and I felt at the time that I could assist by developing a Flag Education Program and make it available to the Squadrons in the Detachment. This being done I set out on my own mission to see how the program worked and what the response would be. I had a tremendous amount of support with this from my Squadron and with their help we tried to educate as many people as we could.

It was considered a success and soon my duties changed to other concerns in the Detachment.

Over the years through the many parades I have been in and in my job I have seen many sports events that shows how much Flag Etiquette can be maligned and disrespect to the American Flag. It has been a concern over the years and I have given plenty of thought about how we can try to get the general public to display and respect the Flag correctly. It seems that the youth of our country is an important piece of this puzzle. Generations have come and gone since 1989, so we need educate each generation over and over again. Although it may have been a success we were not successful because we should have continued that program into perpetuity.

The American Legions stand on Flag desecration is clear and their position has

changed in all of the years. Recently a statement was made by our president- elect who thought that there should be penalties for desecration of the flag. So does The American Legion although they do not offer any ideas on what those penalties should be. I am sure that the Supreme Court justices will deliver a fair verdict on any question that needs to be defined.

I believe that The Sons of The American Legion have a responsibility to their eligible veterans to help protect and educate the public on proper flag etiquette. We also have a network in place and squadrons can reach out in their areas to achieve this very lofty goal. Our communities have come to rely on the many projects and programs that **Con't pg 7**

From pg 5 assist people, youth sports, and organizations that help kids, Police, Fire Departments and the list is endless. I have always said that if you were to take an American Legion Post out of a town it wouldn't be very long before it would be missed and that town would not be as vibrant as it once was. I believe that part of our responsibility is to promote the ideals and patriotism that our eligible veterans displayed and to carry on for God and country. We also have a responsibility to our country and collectively we as Sons of The American Legion have the energy, the commitment, we have the network to deliver Americanism programs across this country and beyond. So it would seem to me that this type of project could actually be developed and put into our Squadron By -Laws

as a Standing Committee.

I stated in an earlier communication that many of our Americanism programs are already developed for use by The American Legion and Flag Education is no exception. There are assorted publications available for a modest fee at The American Legion Flag & Emblem Sales. Let's Be Right on Flag Etiquette -\$1.00, Our Country's Flag Comic Book - \$.75, Light of Liberty Comic Book - \$.75, Pledge of Allegiance Comic Book - \$.75, The Flag Code \$.20, and a DVD 'For Which It Stands' - \$9.95.

The DVD comes with different segments to either break it down in to parts or run a 20 minute video and a teacher's guide to accomplish the lesson. There is special pricing available for all of these items when purchased in bulk of 100.

You can even go through the Let's be right on Flag etiquette booklet pick out the areas that you feel are important to the group that you will be teaching. The lesson should be enough to whet the student's appetite for more knowledge; all students depending on their age are given a copy of one of these publications so that when the class is over it really is just the beginning of their Flag Education. It would be important to include some hands on training such as the folding of the flag. This will assist in driving home the lessons as well.

Let's give back to our communities by offering an educational experience that will definitely keep on giving.

Children & Youth Month—April

"Celebrated as "Children and Youth Month" Since 1938, April is the perfect time of the year to demonstrate that The American Legion Family is committed to its community, and especially its children.

Post families can host a child or youth themed community event (Children's Award ceremony), invite a subject matter expert to present at a meeting (Children's Miracle Network – CMN, Children's Organ Transplant Association (COTA), collaborate on a project with a local school (collecting donations for Children's Home); or any number of other activities.

Children represent the future of our nation and it is up to us to equip them with knowledge, leadership skills and a commitment to service that they will use as productive adult citizens of the United States."

The above came directly out of The American Legion, Children and Youth Programs pamphlet that can be received from the Americanism Commission of The American Legion, I did edit a little bit, but the wording was really, really good to begin with.

The pamphlet is divided into just a couple of categories, including stating and awesome mission statement: The purpose of the Children and Youth Committee is to formulate, recommend and implement plans, programs and activities designed to: Assume care and protection for children of Veterans. Improve conditions for all children and youth, with due concerns for

maintaining the integrity of the family home. Prevent social and physical ills of children and youth where possible. AND Maintain a balanced program that provides for their physical, emotional, intellectual and spiritual needs.

Category I: Family Emphasis Programs include, but not limited to: Family Support Network and Temporary Financial Assistance. Both programs assist the financial situations of the child in the home directly.

Category 2: Child Safety Programs include: Gateway Drugs: harmful effects of drugs; Warning signs: suicide; Halloween Safety: warning of personal safety; Missing Children: identification programs to help ID children that have gone missing for whatever reason. **Con't pg 8**

From pg 7 Category 3: Children's Charities Programs that are handled through National Headquarters are The American Legion Child Welfare Foundation that issues grant for educational and research studies on children health concern: diabetes, sickle cell, and cancer just to name a few; and The American Legion Endowment Fund: money available to assist Veterans and their families to adjust while struggling to return to a normal life, which started back in 1925. They are a great deal of things that, we as members of The American Legion Family, can do ourselves for the children of this country. Here are a couple of easy and fun things that we can do, and enjoy food at the same time. Ask your local IHOP (International House of Pancakes) when their Pancake Appreciation Day is, usually the 2nd Tuesday in February. Donations go to the Children's Miracle Network and you get a free stack of pancakes. Dairy Queen also gives money to CMN when you purchase a blizzard; this is usually in March, but again ask.






