Putting Be the One first

American Legion Post 180 in Vienna, Va., celebrated the nation's birthday while conducting outreach to support those who swore to protect our nation with their lives.

More than 35 American Legion Family members and community supporters participated in the post's third annual Celebrate America 5K, which was combined with The American Legion Be the One initiative. The July I run-walk event was among the initial post events held on the first of the month, intended to be a specific day to raise awareness in communities throughout the nation, per Resolution 13, approved by the National Executive Committee.

The Be the One initiative's goal is to reduce the rate of veteran suicide by raising awareness about the issue, empowering everyone to take appropriate action, and connecting veterans with fitness and wellness opportunities. American Legion National Commander Vincent "James" Troiola has made the initiative a priority, encouraging posts and members to find ways to raise awareness in whatever way fits best in their communities.

"Fitness and wellness go hand-in-hand with the Be the One campaign," Post 180 First Vice Commander Dave Wallace said. "Be the One to listen. Be the One to reach out. Be the One to stop one veteran from com- mitting suicide. Having the wellness side has been proven to be the key factor in an individual's mindset. So having this event just made sense."

Past National Commander Dan Dellinger was among the participants.

"Post 180 has taken to heart the program by National Commander Troiola," he said. "Be the One is very important to help stop veterans suicides. If you see something or hear something, say something.

Dellinger noted the post is aiming to bang a continuous drumbeat of spreading the word throughout the community.

"We have a large veterans community here," he explained. "We are going to try to do something on the first Saturday of every month to promote (Be the One.) We are going to try to continue to do this as much as possible.

After all, Dellinger concluded, Be the One drives toward the heart of The American Legion's dedication to helping fellow veterans.

"Every servicemember had a battle buddy. We stood beside them in battle. We need to make sure we stand beside them today."

Post member Mike Paruti organized the 5K, which started and ended at the post. Participants received information packets about the Be the One, which was also highlighted on the keepsake T-shirt. (Visit, access and download promotional materials at the Be the One resources page.)

"Be the One is, of course, a very special message," said Paruti, noting that this year's 5K is the first held since 2019. "It's very special that we rebirth this event with the Be the One message. Hopefully, they take away that message and understand how easy it is to Be the One. If you see any signs of where the message might apply, act on it."

Paruti was pleased with the turnout.

"It was great to have everyone come out, a mix of young, old, fast, slow, veterans, non-veterans. Everyone supports the military, which is great. But it's great to know that there are so many people who support our military, The American Legion, and our post in this community."

Vienna Mayor Linda Colbert was among Legion Family members and others from the community who walked the 5K.

"I love to support The American Legion and whatever event they are doing, and I love to be here and support them," she said. "I'm all about being healthy and doing things to support our town. I also love seeing people here being so patriotic."

Post 180 is the service organization with the longest tenure in its town, Wallace said. That dedication to community is seen in its various community events not just for the Fourth of July but throughout the year.

"This also allows us to show how we educate the children, our different programs that can reach out to them with Boys State, Junior Law Cadet program and others, and remind everyone who we are and what we can bring to the community," he explained. Palou's incredible roll continues with win at Mid-Ohio

Just when it seemed Chip Ganassi Racing's (CGR) Alex Palou couldn't look any more dominant, he did. And the result was another win in the No. 10 American Legion Honda.

In Sunday's Honda Indy 200 at Mid-Ohio, it was again Palou controlling the end of the race, to the point where the television broadcast was more focused on closer battles for positions eight and lower. He wound up finishing 5.0242 seconds head of CGR teammate Scott Dixon, leading the final 24 laps of the race.

It was Palou's third straight win and fourth in five NTT INDYCAR SERIES races – three of those in Legion's Be the One No. 10. Only twice since 2016 has a driver won three straight races in the series, with the last being Dixon in 2020.

"Third win in a row for the No. 10 car, super special to do it here at Mid-Ohio where we've been good in the past," Palou said via CGR media. "We needed that win, and it's a special weekend for Honda. We had all the power and fuel mileage we needed to make our strategy work. We went long and just ran really fast lap times to get to Victory Lane. We did it and we're going to keep it going with The American Legion."

Palou took his first lead on lap 28, led again laps 31-53, and then took his final lead on lap 53 after passing polesitter Colton Herta and No. 2 qualifier Graham Rahal. His lead grew to as many as eight seconds the rest of the way.

"I had a good car and good strategy, honestly," Palou said. "We've got a really fast car, (but) we knew we needed to try something different to the guys starting up front – that's why we started on primary (tires). Everything went well. The strategy, the pit stops, and our pace was pretty good."

Palou's lead in the INDYCAR SERIES points standings ballooned to 110 points over the second-place Dixon. Also worth noting is the past three times an INDYCAR driver won three races in a row – Dixon in 2013 and 2020, and Simon Pagenaud in 2016 – they went on to take the series championship.

"I know we can have some good couple of races coming up now, and we'll still try and maximize (points), do the best we can and win when we can," Palou said. "So, yeah, try and get (the car) on top."

Rookie Marcus Armstrong had another strong weekend while carrying American Legion branding on his No. 11 Ridgeline Lubricants Honda. After qualifying 18th, he was able to move up nine spots by the close of the race, increasing his lead in the INDYCAR SERIES rookie points race.

"It was a good race," Armstrong said. "In the end, we made up a lot of track position there by just staying out and doing fast laps. We did that for the rest of the day, that same strategy, and it paid off. The team did a great job in pit lane. Blair, Eric, and the rest of the crew did a great job on pit wall. I just drove as fast as I could, it turned out well, but we can do better next time."

Also carrying American Legion branding was Marcus Ericsson, who entered the race second in the points standings. But Ericsson was involved in an on-track incident with Felix Rosenqvist on the opening lap of the race that forced the No. 8 Huski Ice Spritz Honda back to the garage for repairs. After briefly returning to the race track at the halfway mark, the No. 8 car was forced to retire as a result of the damage sustained in the first lap crash, leading to a 27th-place finish. Ericsson still sits at fourth in the series championship.

"At the start, I thought I had more grip there, but bumped into Felix's tire and went over his car," Ericsson said. "It's very disappointing for the No. 8 car and crew, as well as Felix. It was never my intention, obviously, so I feel really bad for him. Congrats to the team on the I-2 finish."

In the INDY NXT race earlier in the day, Chip Ganassi Racing developmental driver Kyffin Simpson recorded his best finish of the season and put together maybe his best overall weekend behind the wheel of the No. 21 HMD Motorsports/Ridgeline Lubricants featuring American Legion branding. After topping the weekend's second practice session, Simpson was able to qualify third for the Firestone Grand Prix at Mid-Ohio.

Simpson ran near the top of the field the entire race and then used a late restart to pass Christian Rasmussen and score a second-place finish behind Louis Foster. The performance moved Simpson from 13th to ninth in the INDY NXT points standings.

"The HMD crew gave me a great car this weekend," Simpson posted on Instagram. "I felt comfortable from the first lap and even with all the safety cars, rain, and the pressure from behind, we didn't make any mistakes. Hard but fair racing all round and I gave it everything chasing Louis down for the win. Didn't quite have enough laps to get there... P2."

Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation

You may or may not have heard, but The American Legion has finally granted our request to allow the Sons of The American Legion to Certify our own VAVS Representatives and Deputies at VA Hospitals and Medical Centers across the Country! This resolution was passed by the SAL at the Fall 2022 NEC Meeting, with subsequent approval by TAL at their Spring meetings. This has been a major undertaking by our VA&R Commission over the last couple of years, and is a major accomplishment for all of us with The Sons of The American Legion!

There is a large untapped need at every VA across the Country for volunteers, support, and the fulfillment of needs for our Veterans. This is now our opportunity to fill those needs without time delays, unnecessary red tape, and extraneous levels of approval that only delay our mission. Simply stated, a VAVS (Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service) Representative and/or Deputy appointment allows our Organization to have a "liaison" to a VA facility. That individual then communicates what needs there are to fill and what ways there are that we as Sons can help, in each and every VA.

Attached is a short brochure describing the role of a VAVS Representative and/or Deputy. It is a volunteer position that is available at EVERY VA FACILITY, with over 155 facilities in the U.S. Each VA can have I Representative from the SAL and multiple Deputies. The Sons of The American Legion is currently I of only 41 Veteran and/or Community Service Organizations that is authorized by the Dept. of Veteran Affairs to be a member of the National Advisory Council, providing these positions and services at VA facilities.

It has been a cumbersome process to appoint VAVS Representative and Deputies up to this point, but that has now ended with our new ability to certify these positions across the Country. A Certification form is also attached to this email. An appointment to a Representative or Deputy now only requires the approval of the Detachment Adjutant and Detachment VA&R Chairman. Note: Associate positions are for a Representative or Deputy who will be at a VA that is in a neighboring State from his Detachment.

PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE, identify I or 2 individuals to serve in these capacities at your neighboring VA. If you have 5 facilities within your Detachment, then line-up members for each of the 5. This is such an important role, and is so important that we build on what we have.

We currently have Representatives and/or Deputies in 31 VA facilities across the Country. That means we need to fill the other 124!



- Clerical positions
- Chaplain Services

- · Audiology/Pharmacy helpers
- · Bingo or other activities

Services rendered for functions performed other than those assigned by the VA in the Volunteer assignment given, are not credited hours for the VA's records, but may be accounted for by the affiliated Organization of the Volunteer



VAVS REPRESENTATIVE & DEPUTY HANDBOOK

The U.S. Veterans Administration Center for Development & Civic Engagement Office or formerly Voluntary Service (VAVS), operates the largest volunteer program in the federal government supplementing staff and resources in all areas of patient support.

VAVS Purpose and Structure

Purpose: To assist with the coordination of plans and policies for community participation in VA's Programs, and provide support for its needs. Membership: 1 Representative and up to 3 Deputy Representatives per certified Organization.

Member Selection Process

The source for appointment nominations may vary in each Organization. Many originate at a local level, or at other levels of the Organization that are deemed responsible for a VA territory or region.

- Individuals are nominated using that Organization's nomination forms at the local and state-level as defined by that Organization.
- Final Certification is by the National Certifying Official of the Organization.

VA is not involved in the nomination process unless a nominee is rejected after a background check or is considered unacceptable. Appointments are not official or in effect until notice is received by letter to the specific CDCE Manager from the Organization's National Certifying Official.

Membership Qualifications

- Be a Registered Regular Scheduled (RS) Volunteer at the VA facility.
- A sincere interest in the welfare of hospitalized and other Veterans, and a desire to help them
- · The ability to work with others
- Knowledge of your organization and the ability to communicate and disseminate information
- Attend Regularly Scheduled Quarterly Meetings
