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Be The One to Be The One

A few weeks ago, a friend of mine, told me about a Veteran who took his life in front of his wife and young child. That was a sad day when another veteran takes his/or her own life. It is real...all too real.

Detachment Commander Chaplin's theme this year follows in step with what the American Legion's theme of 'Be The One' Commander Chaplin's theme is 'Be The

One' campaign focused on Veteran Suicide and Mental Health Awareness. 17 to 22 veterans a day take their own lives. The mission of The American Legion's Be the One initiative is to reduce the rate of veteran suicide. It aims to lessen the stigma associated with mental health treatment and empower everyone to take appropriate action when a veteran or servicemember may be at risk.

What are warning signs?

A veteran or servicemember in crisis might talk about wanting to die, express guilt or shame, or mention being a burden to others.

They also might feel like they have no reason to live or show feelings of emptiness, hopelessness or being trapped. They might appear extremely sad, anxious, agitated, or full or rage.

Behaviors to look for include: isolating, giving away belongings, indulging in risky behavior and using drugs and/or alcohol more often. **Cont'd pg. 7**

George Washington's Birthday

(A.K.A., Presidents' Day)



Generally called "Presidents' Day," this holiday is still officially referred to as "Washington's Birthday" by the Federal Office of Personnel Management (OPM). It has been celebrated on the third Monday of February since Congress passed HR 15951 in 1968. Before that time, it was celebrated on the 22nd of February in honor of the birth of our First President, George Washington.

By the early 19th century, Washington's Birthday had taken firm

root in the American experience as a bona fide national holiday. Its traditions included Birthnight Balls in various regions, speeches and receptions given by prominent public figures, and a lot of revelry in taverns throughout the land.

Then along came Abraham Lincoln, another revered president and fellow February baby (born on the 12th of the month). The first formal observance of his birthday took place in 1866, the year after his assassination, when both houses of Congress gathered for a memorial address. While Lincoln's Birthday did not become a federal holiday like George Washington's, it did become a legal holiday in several states.(1)

In fact, the largest celebration of the birth of George Washington occurs right in his hometown of Alexandria, VA with a Birthnight Ball at Gadsby's Tavern and the mile long annual Washington's Birthday Parade.

As mentioned before, the holiday was originally celebrated on the date of Washington's birth. But do we actually know when General Washington was born? That is a more complicated and interesting question than you may suspect and was a matter of confusion even in his lifetime.

When George Washington was born, the British Empire followed the Julian calendar which had survived from the days when it was proposed by Julius Caesar in 42 B.C. (708 Ab Urbe Condita). By 1582, the Julian calendar was out of step with the seasons by 10 days. Under the sponsorship of Pope Gregory XIII, a new calendar, the "Gregorian," was adopted which proved more accurate. For example, the Julian calendar gains one day, relative to the seasons, every 128 years whereas the Gregorian only gains one day every, 3,030 years.

Most Catholic countries of Europe adopted the new calendar fairly quickly. Protestant countries on the continent followed suit. The main holdout was England, later the British Empire, which did not convert their civil calendar to the Gregorian until 1752. By this time, the Julian calendar was 11 days out of step with the seasons. When the British Empire (including the American colonies) finally changed, the day after Wednesday, September 2nd, 1752 became Thursday, September 14th, 1752. Interestingly, this change led to demonstrations **Continued on Page 7**

by people demanding, "Give us our 11 days back!"

To make matters more complicated, the Romans had established January 1st as the beginning of the year, which the Gregorian calendar of the Roman Catholic Church continued to do. However, many countries' calendars changed year on either December 25th (the Nativity of Jesus) or March 25th (the Incarnation of Jesus). From 1087 to 1155 the English year began on January 1st and from 1155 to 1751 began on March 25th. In 1752 it was moved back to January 1st. Thus, the days of the week from January 1st to March 24th are still 1751 and the year did not turn to 1752 until March 25th.

By the time of his 21st birthday in 1753 these changes combined to effectively slide the date of George Washington's birthday by 11 days and change the year, from February 11th, 1731 to February 22nd, 1732, during his lifetime! To Washington and his contemporaries 1752 would appear to have been only 9 months and 6 days long.... from March 25th to December 31st.

Confused? You can bet our predecessors were too! The Julian and Gregorian calendars are today 13 days out of step. So, whenever you are teaching about patriotism and Americanism from our early colonial period, take care when you cite dates!

What should I say?

Ask them what's going on. Let them know they aren't alone. Ask the direct question: Are you having thoughts of suicide?

Encourage them to keep sharing.

Offer to connect them to someone who can help.

What should I not say?


DO NOT tell them you know how they feel. DO NOT condemn or minimize their thoughts or feelings.


DO NOT tell them to be thankful for what they have.

What else should I know?

In these cases, remember your mission is not to act as a mental health professional. Your mission is to connect them to the professionals. It is best to listen carefully, take any comments about suicide seriously, and look for cues in their words and behavior.

Reassure them that it is OK to ask for help and offer to connect them with resources. DO NOT ignore warning signs. DO NOT keep it a secret. American Legion

MEMO: SAL NATIONAL RESOLUTION FLOW PROCESS

Resolutions should be submitted at least 30 days before NEC or Convention.

All resolutions will be timestamped by the National Sons of The American Legion (SAL) Liaison with the National Adjutant being informed through each step of the process. Once a resolution is numbered, the original number will stay attached with possible revision numbering added on if necessary. All resolutions will be reviewed by the TAL Resolution Screening Committee (RSC) before being reviewed by the SAL commission or committee.

- 1) Resolution sent to National Liaison for recording. National Liaison assigns a number and acknowledges receipt of the resolution to the sender.
- 2) National Liaison informs the National Adjutant of the status of resolutions. The National Adjutant will coordinate with the TAL RSC chairman to coordinate a meeting time.
- 3) Three weeks before the meeting (NEC or Convention), RSC meets, reviews the resolutions, and returns to the National Liaison for the next step. (If the resolution has financial intent, RSC will forward it to the National Liaison to record receipt and (24hrs) send the resolution to TAL Finance Commission for review.
- 4) The National Liaison sends the numbered resolution to the SAL commission or committee for them to champion and will cc the SAL Sub-committee on resolutions.
- 5) The commission or committee will meet at the NEC or convention for disposition status. Approved resolutions are sent to the Sub-committee on resolutions. When the commission or committee has reviewed, modified, or rejected the resolution it will return to the national liaison. Approved resolutions are officially sent to the Sub-committee on resolutions. Rejected resolutions will be returned to the sponsoring detachment as well as the commission or committee with an explanation.
- Sub-committee on resolutions meets at the NEC or convention before going to the SAL NEC. Rejected or held for further study are notated in the report of the commission to the NEC, but not presented to the NEC.
- 7) All SAL NEC resolutions are given to the TAL IA commission in the IA report to the TAL NEC for review and approval. Once approved, all resolutions are placed on the website.





The selfless service of the Four Chaplains

There is perhaps no greater example of selfless service in the military than the story of the four chaplains who made the ultimate sacrifice during World War II.

"We have a perfect example here of four individuals who exhibited that and give us a legacy that we have to carry on," said retired Navy Capt. Louis A. Cavaliere, vice chairman of the Four Chaplains Memorial Foundation board of directors.

He was among those attending a Four Chaplains Day ceremony, conducted by American Legion District 9 in Florida on Jan. 28. While American Legion posts throughout the nation conduct similar remembrances near the Feb. 3, 1943, anniversary of the USS Dorchester sinking, this one is particularly impressive.

"I have been to many ceremonies not only in the United States but all over the world, and I would say this ranks as one of the more moving ones that I have been to," Cavaliere said.

American Legion National Commander Daniel J. Seehafer, a chaplain, also attended the ceremony.

"Today is an awesome event," the Navy veteran proclaimed. "As we remember something that happened on Feb. 3, 1943. And why is that day so important to remember? It's the day we call 'Four Chaplains.' Four individuals, men of God, gave their lives, to save lives."

Army veteran George "Geo" Bograkos, judge advocate for Post 92 in Hollywood, Fla., coordinated the event.

"We are honoring the four chaplains that went down with the USS Dorchester," he said. "They, in effect, sacrificed their lives for four other sailors. We honor them every year."

The ceremony has been taking place for at least 20 years. But this year, American Legion members rallied to find a new location. The usual location — the I.T. Parker Community Center in Dania Beach is currently undergoing major repairs due to flooding last April. This year, the ceremony was held at the NSU Guy Harvey Oceanographic Center Campus in Dania Beach.

"It means a great deal to us to have Commander Seehafer here with us," Bograkos said. "The fact that he is a chaplain is a plus. We are very pleased and enthused to have him here."

Seehafer drew a comparison from the four chaplains of the 1940s to what American Legion Family members can do today.

"We remember the great sacrifice, we remember the courage, we remember the bravery. It's a selfless act. Putting self last and others first. This is a prime example of servant leadership." *American Legion Website—Henry Howard and Hilary Ott,* January 31, 2024

Food For Thought...

Over the years, I have heard people say, or have read things that were written that made me wonder where it came from. I'm sure that some of you have had the same questions pop-up in your head, but never got the answer. Maybe someone can help answer these questions?

Why do Squadrons hold cards? I was trained many years ago that when a member pays his dues, you immediately send them to Detachment headquarters, or now submit them via MySAL. Holding cards could cost Squadrons and Districts in the long run.

What's with the rhythmic clapping during meetings? As a sports official at many levels, I am around many crowds. I have spoken at many events in front of large audiences. I have not heard this any where else. Anyone know the origins of this ovation?



Where's all the kids? Every Squadron has members who are under the age of 18. Why don't we see more of them at the Mid-Winter Conference or National and Detachment Conventions? I know that meetings can be boring for younger people, but how else will they learn about our amazing organization?

Where's the event? Too often I see flyers, email announcements, social media announcements asking folks to attend their functions. Many do not list the address

or the town. They simply say something like, "Event at Squadron XX." For someone who may want to attend from out of town, how will they know where to go?

I pay my dues in the spring. Who came up with that? It is unheard-of to wait so long. In other organizations I am a member of, one in particular, we have a 30-day window to get our dues paid If we decide to pay after the 30-days, there is a hefty late fee. What's the deal?

All in favor... I have heard leaders of meetings say the following: "All in favor signify by saying aye, opposed same sign." Here's the question, if voting AYE is in favor of a motion, and we say, "opposed same sign," is everyone voting in favor of the question? I believe it's the Ayes and Nos or the Yeas and Nays. Just asking. Maybe Roberts knows.

Since I mentioned officiating earlier, let's bring some of what I learned there into the Sons. We are always told, "Speak the language so everyone under- stands each other." This is a vital part to the success of a sports official. If players, coaches, and officials all use the same terminology to describe something, everyone ends up on the same page.

When we work for The American Legion Family, we need to do the same. Let's make a concerted effort to say American Legion Auxiliary, Sons, and to use the words that are part of the organization. Suicide prevention, safeguarding veterans benefits among Legion's 2024 legislative agenda

Ahead of The American Legion's Washington Conference, taking place Feb. 25-28, the Legion has released its legislative agenda for the second session of the 118th Congress.

Among the priorities on the agenda:

Suicide prevention and mental health. Suicide remains a top issue in the veteran community. The suicide rate among veterans is nearly double that of civilian counterparts. It is imperative that we simultaneously destigmatize mental health assistance, while increasing access. The American Legion encourages Congress to robustly fund VA's suicide prevention outreach budget and peer support programs. We encourage all Americans to "Be the One" who is willing, ready, and able to have a difficult conversation about suicide and other mental health issues. Legislation supported by The American Legion include PFC Joseph P. Dwyer Peer Support Program (H.R. 2768) and VA Zero Suicide Demonstration Act (H.R. 1639).

Alternative treatments. Data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH) shows that in 2021, approximately 2.8 million veterans experienced an illicit drug or alcohol use disorder, with 92.4 percent not receiving treatment. More must be done to ensure veterans have access to the effective treatments they desire. This includes expanding research and access into alter- native treatments and emerging therapies. Legislation supported by The American Legion includes TBI and PTSD Treatment Act (H.R. 105).

VA healthcare modernization. The biggest issue in the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Healthcare Modernization is the implementation of the new electronic health record modernization program (EHRM). VA has experienced difficulties as the EHRM rollout has progressed. Some issues identified were the differences in the training software compared to end-user software, along with inexperienced instructors providing the training to VA staff. VA made improvements on these identified issues. As the EHRM rollout is set to resume in 2024, The American Legion continues to call on Congress to provide oversight and to hold VA and other relevant parties accountable for the implementation and functioning of the EHR system. Legislation supported by The American Legion includes The Department of Veterans Affairs Electronic Health Record Modernization Improvement Act (H.R. 592).

PACT Act implementation and oversight. Since the implementation of Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act, VA has screened more than 5 million veterans for toxic exposure. The average time to complete a PACT Act-related claim is 157 days. It is imperative that VA fully leverage the resources made available in the PACT Act to assist in the continued modernization of Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) information technology systems as well as the hiring of additional employees to ensure claims are adjudicated in a timely manner. The American Legion urges Congress to provide the necessary oversight and funding to ensure VA has the resources to properly implement this legislation.

Safeguard veterans benefits. Veterans are facing a growing threat from exploitative entities aiming to capitalize on the benefits rightfully earned through military service. These predatory actors range from claims companies charging exorbitant fees to lawyers seeking sizable portions of VA disability benefit payments. The American Legion urges Congress to pass legislation to restore criminal penalties for persons or companies that represent or charge veterans fees to file; prepare or prosecute initial VA claims without VA accreditation; and to oppose any legislation that would allow unaccredited parties to become legal representatives without completing the accreditation process. The American Legion's advocacy role remains focused on safeguarding the well-deserved benefits of those who have served. April is Children and Youth Month

WHAT CAN I DO?

The American Legion has been actively involved with children's issues since the early 1920s. In many instances, The American Legion has been the driving force on behalf of children on the federal, state and local levels.

In 1938, April was formally designated as Child Welfare Month (now called Children & Youth Month) and has continued on an annual basis. During this special time, we encourage each of you to show your community that the American Legion Family is dedicated to America's youth.

Each year the Committee on Children & Youth focuses on three primary areas of concern. They may include:

Child health-Immunization programs, School nutrition programs, Teen pregnancy prevention programs.

Child safety- Child pornography, Drug abuse prevention, Drug trafficking, Alcohol abuse prevention, Child/sexual abuse and neglect, Teen suicide prevention.

Family support-National Family Week activities, Day care safety, Foster care, Temporary Financial Assistance, Missing and exploited children.

WHERE DO I BEGIN?

To start, consider:

Obtaining speakers to talk about particular concerns or topics within your community.

Asking local law enforcement to do a bike safety demonstration, finger printing or to talk about internet safety.

Conducting a community project with and for children.

Forming a Community Committee on Children & Youth to discuss current problems, generate solutions and then take action.

Sponsoring a carnival or talent show featuring young people to raise money for a community project.

Featuring a youth panel at a local school where participants can discuss some of their concerns.

Using videos, if applicable, enlisting the aid of an individual familiar with the subject matter to both present it and be available to answer questions following the viewing.

Use these suggestions, or develop your own projects, but get involved. Remember, the only limitation you have for youth programs and activities is your own imagination!

LEGISLATIVE ACTION

Legislation to improve conditions for children is a focal point of The American Legion's Children & Youth program. By working on behalf of sound legislation, The American Legion, in accordance with mandated positions, strives to bring into enactment the laws necessary to meet the needs of all children.

Whether the legislation involves a local matter, pertains to a problem of a particular state or is an item of national concern, it requires the efforts of all interested in the well- being **Continued on page 18**

of children and youth if it is to become law.

Most state assemblies begin their sessions early in the year. This is the best time to present legislators with any new legislation or changes needed in current laws.

Within each community, there is a great deal of local legislative action, which deserves continued attention: city ordinances affecting children and

youth, appropriations for schools and school budgets, immunization, child abuse and neglect statutes, juvenile courts, local public welfare departments, playgrounds, traffic regulations and other such matters relating to the health and welfare of children.

There is a great need for informed public participation in local government matters. And when it comes to local matters affecting our children and youth, The American Legion should make itself heard.

PROMOTE YOUR ACTIVITIES

You should publicize your programs and activities. Have the mayor or another local official issue a proclamation declaring April as Children & Youth Month. The post commander should issue a news release proclaiming April as Children & Youth Month and list what the post will be doing for this annual observance.

Remember, programs supporting the children and youth of your community are news! Invite the news media to your activities and keep them informed.

REPORT SUCCESSES

Following the observance of Children & Youth Month, the Children & Youth chairmen need to turn their attention to the annual reporting of expenditures and activities. Be sure you have an accurate record of all money spent for the benefit of children and youth by your post/unit during the current year, as well as the number of children who received services and assistance.

Shortly after the first of the year, American Legion departments receive copies of the Consolidated Post Report (CPR) for later distribution to posts. This form has been developed to track necessary information about The American Legion's overall program. It is the responsibility of the post Children & Youth chairman to report his/her program activities to the individual designated in the post to complete the Consolidated Post Report.
