April: Month of The Military Child



Military children are strong, resilient, and supportive individuals who face many challenges and unique experiences due to their parents' military service. According to the U.S. Department of Defense, there are more than 1.6 million military children in the United States. These kids encounter trials and tribulations that are often invisible and unacknowledged.

"Military children grow up facing a myriad of different issues than most children living in our communities they face a huge number of challenges," said Dr. Coral

May Grout, ALA national Children & Youth Committee chair. "The responsibilities of dealing with a parent in the military impact not only the spouse or other caregiver, but it impacts the child."

To show military children our gratitude and recognize their bravery, April is dedicated as Military Child Appreciation Month, officially known as the Month of the Military Child (MOMC). Created in the mid-1980s, military support organizations use the month to honor the sacrifice and commitment our military children make every day.

"Devoting a month to these children demonstrates that we are behind them and that their needs are not forgotten," said Grout. "With all of these challenges facing military children, it's imperative that we join together within our communities and with our schools to provide support to these kids."

Greetings from the Detachment of Virgina. First, I would like to congratulate everyone on the outstanding work everyone is doing with membership. The Detachment has met every national membership goal this year well in advance of the goal date. As of March 31, 2025, the Detachment is at 93.8% of the 100% goal and 6th in the nation. We always set our sights a little bit higher, and our internal goals are to reach 105% of last year's numbers. Last year we reached 4,512 members at 103.32% of our goal. This year we are 4,276 and we are only

174 members from reaching the 100% goal. Keep up the good work!

By the time you read this article, your Squadron should have received the Consolidated Squadron Report. This report documents all the volunteer time and money donated to benefit The American Legion programs. It is very important that every Squadron submit this form to the Commander or Adjutant. This information is used by The American Legion National Commander when he testifies in Congress. It shows the immense value The American Legion family brings to our Veterans, our children and youth, our community and our Nation. Last year the Detachment of Virginia donated \$225,409 and volunteered 92,724 hours. A Volunteer hour is valued at \$29.95 which brings the value of hours donated to \$2,777,069. Combining the dollars donated and the value of hours donated, Virgina SAL volunteers donated \$3,002,478. We accomplished this with only 43% of active Squadrons reporting. Please make sure

your Squadron submits a report this year. **Continued on page 4**

They can be sent to myself or any detachment officer. It ensures that all receive important communication as well as ensuring the correct information is uploaded for each squadron to National. to our nation's military kids during the Month of the Military Child, and all year long. We need to come together to celebrate their selflessness and sacrifice from behind the scenes as they too, serve our country.

"Units and Squadrons can contact their nearest United Service Organizations (USOs), and the USO will provide opportunities to help with events and activities," Grout recommended. "Contact Big Brothers Big Sisters of America to offer your help — the ALA recommends this in the Children & Youth Program Engagement Plan. If you don't live near a military facility, offer your help to local schools."

In addition to April focusing on military children, there is also a specific day to honor them — Purple Up! Day — *April 11, 2025.* On this special day, people are encouraged to wear purple as a symbol of support for military kids. Purple symbolizes the combined colors of the branches of the military — Army green, Marine Corps red, Navy blue, Air Force blue, and Coast Guard blue. Purple Up! Day raises awareness of the unique challenges faced by military children, including frequent moves, deployments, and separations from loved ones. This day also serves as a reminder that these young heroes face obstacles not experienced by their civilian peers.

"Military children don't wear a badge that identifies them as military children — their friends and family know, but it's not something shared elsewhere," said Grout. "Wearing purple is a quiet but powerful way to show those military kids you care."

Ways to Celebrate Month of The Military Child

Get involved in schools. Contact your local schools and ask if you or your unit can devote a special day to military kids with a breakfast or lunch to show your appreciation.

• Volunteer your time. Volunteer at military events and activities in your area. Military bases offer events and celebration-like festivals and carnivals in April. Contact your closest military base or USO for any opportunities.

• Plan an event at your American Legion post home for military children. Plan fun crafts, followed by a dinner. Ask them to share their story and the adventures they've experienced.

• Wear purple on Purple Up! Day. Encourage your community members, friends, family, and Legion Family members to wear purple on Purple Up! Day. Anyone can support our military children — ask as many people as you can to acknowledge this day.

• **Raise awareness.** Share pictures of your American Legion Family wearing purple, and post them on social media to spread awareness. Post photos to the ALA Children & Youth Facebook group at www.Facebook.com/groups/ALAChildrenandYouth. Ask your local mayor, state senator, or state representative to recognize Purple Up! Day.

• Share information. Contact your local newspaper, radio station, or news station so they can include a segment about MOMC and spread the word about this important month. Source—American Legion Auxiliary National Website.

REACHcycles was established in 2014, as a chapter of AMBUCS a national organization, founded in 1922. James Howard, REACHcycles president, received an AmTryke from the LRDF chapter in SC to participate in a disabled veterans cycle event. This AmTryke gave him purpose and an opportunity to be with veteran comrades. This valuable step in his recovery led him to start REACHcycles in 2014 in Richmond, VA. This also led his mother, Nancy Wellons, to start a chapter, Wheels On The James, which is located in Lynchburg, VA. It operates under REACHcycles and the two organizations combined have donated over 1,000 bikes in Virginia. May is Military Appreciation Month

In May 1999, Congress via the late Senator John McCain (AZ) adopted a month-long observance in the United States dedicated to people who are currently serving in, and veterans of, the United States military. Each year, the month observance runs from 01 May to 31 May.

May was adopted because it has more then a few patriotic military holidays and remembrances ... among them:

- Silver Star Banner Day: Per Congressional resolution, 01 May is an "official day to honor wounded, ill, and injured veterans."
- Victory in Europe Day: Observed on 08 May, this day marks the end of World War II in Europe.
- Military Spouse Appreciation Day: Celebrated on the Friday before Mother's Day, this day recognizes the contributions and sacrifices of military spouses. This year it falls on 09 May.
- Armed Forces Day: Celebrated on the third Saturday of May, this day honors those currently serving in the U.S. Armed Forces. This year it's on 17 May.
- **Memorial Day:** Observed on the last Monday of May, this federal holiday commemorates the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. This year it is on 26 May 2025.



The Child Welfare Foundation is now doing business as the Child Well-Being Foundation

The American Legion Child Welfare Foundation is now called the Child Well-Being Foundation.

On Oct. 6 during the annual Fall Meetings of The American Legion, a motion was made and voted on by the American Legion CWF board of directors to change the name of the foundation to one that encompasses the overall needs of the whole child and all aspects of their physical, emotional, mental and spiritual wellbeing.

The Child Well-Being Foundation will still have the acronym CWF.

CWF will continue to provide grants to nonprofits for projects that contribute to the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual needs of children. Grants are only given to entities that help U.S. children in a large geographic area; they are not awarded for day-to-day or special operating expenses. Thanks to the generosity of Legion Family and community members, the foundation has awarded over \$21 million in grants since 1954 — giving youth-serving nonprofits across this nation the means to promote and operate their programs, plus educate families and communities about the needs of children.

The 2025 CWF grant recipients were announced during the Fall Meetings. In its 71st year, CWF awarded 13 grants totaling \$852,593 to youth-serving nonprofit organizations.

American Kidney Fund of Rockville, Md., was awarded \$25,000 for "American Kidney Fund Virtual Camp: National Camp for Pediatric Kidney Patients." The American Legion and the Sons of The American Legion support this grant.

ASXL Rare Research Endowment Foundation of Portland, Maine, was awarded \$10,550 for "Care Management Educational Materials." The American Legion Auxiliary

supports this grant.

Briggs & Barrett Project of Norfolk, Neb., was awarded \$15,000 for "Every Baby Initiative." The American Legion Auxiliary and the Eight & Forty support this grant.

Camp Corral of Raleigh, N.C., was awarded \$25,000 for "Camp Corral-summer Camp for Children of Military Heroes-2025." The American Legion Auxiliary and the Sons of The American Legion support this grant.
